# From your Commander

### Another Fine Autumn at Post 291!

The Southern California weather continues to be especially inviting for our Post 291 Family members — and it's delightful to see so many of you there enjoying the Post!

With Orange County moving up a tier from Purple to Red, the Post has been permitted to open limited indoor dining along with the outdoor dining. And as the weather begins to become cooler, additional outdoor heaters will be deployed to enhance the comfort of the outdoor dining.

Because of the demonstrated popularity and extraordinary success of the drive-thru takeout food operation, it will be continued indefinitely — although the hours open for both the drive-thru meals and on-premises dining will be adjusted in response to shorter days and reverting to Standard Time. Post Food and Beverage Manager Dennis Fitzpatrick, Kitchen Manager and Chef Ulises Dominguez, Wait Staff Captain Camilo Sabogal, and Bar and Custodial Supervisor Peter Lara and their superbly skilled staffs continue to work their magic with outstanding food, beverage, and dining service.

### **Post Operations Under COVID-19 Restrictions**

State and California Department of Public Health rules for operating under COVID-19 restrictions have been modified periodically over the past several months. The most significant recent change has been to allow limited indoor dining — up to 25 percent of capacity. As a result, the View Room and the Bar area have been reopened for indoor dining. Other areas of the Main Building will be reopened as rules permit and as staff is prepared to respond.

For now, the following services can be and are provided at and by the Post:

- Drive-thru takeout meals. (Open to the public.)
- Dining at the Post. (Limited to Post 291 Family members and their guests.)
  - Outdoor dining on the patios.
  - Indoor dining in the View Room and the Bar area.
  - Beverage service from the Bar.
- Full marina access for slip renters and Guest Dock visitors.
- · Administrative services at the Post Front Office window.
- Support of military veterans needing assistance.

And going forward through the COVID-19 pandemic, Post 291 will continue to comply with the rules and direction from State, County, and City government and health officials. Mask wearing and social distancing will remain standard practice, along with other health and safety protocols. And Post meetings will continue to be held by videoconferencing. The Post Reopening Planning Committee, chaired by Third Vice Commander Jim Updike, will stay abreast of all the latest guidance and direction from State, County, and City officials to determine if and when additional activities become authorized.

### **Recent Post Activities**

Patriot Day. Under the leadership of SAL Squadron 291 Commander Tim Sullivan, the SALs sponsored a recognition ceremony on the Post west patio of the sacrifices of first responders on 9/11. Necessarily, because of the pandemic, attendance was limited.

- WHOW. Post 291 Marina Manager Mark Ayers spearheaded Post support of the War Heroes on Water charitable organization by arranging the provisioning operations for their boats at the Post Guest Dock for its annual fishing tournament for military veterans.
- Red Cross Blood Drive. Led by Auxiliary President Cindy Edes and supported by other key Auxiliary volunteers, Auxiliary Unit 291 sponsored and hosted a very productive blood drive in the Post Main Hall under direction of the Red Cross.
- VEAF Campaign Underway. Service Officer Cory Vigil has launched another Veterans Emergency Assistance Fund (VEAF) campaign — which will wrap up on Veterans Day. This is an extremely important Post fundraising activity that all Post members are strongly encouraged to support for our military veteran comrades needing assistance.

### Post 291 Family Working Together to Support Military Veterans and Their Families

As can be seen from all the fundraising and support activities by every Post 291 Family organization, each of them needs to be recognized for their enormous contributions to the support of our military veterans and their families. — And working together with a combined purpose yields even greater productivity.

### Renew Your Membership!

Member dues are a major, critical component of Post 291 income — and an absolutely essential resource for continuing our American Legion activities and the Post's services to its members and to its employees. The Post has completed actions to enable renewal of American Legion membership by online payment of membership dues. So now there are three convenient methods for paying membership dues and renewing annual American Legion membership:

- Stop by the Post Front Office window weekdays from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm, Monday through Friday, and pay by cash, check, or credit/debit card.
- Call into the Post Front Office weekdays from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm, Monday through Friday, and provide a credit/debit card number — or arrange to send a check by mail.

Go online to the Post website at www.al291.com and follow the instructions for renewing with credit/debit card.

### **Upcoming Activities**

Although holiday events and activities will be substantially reduced and restricted in operation this year because of the pandemic, there are several that are still scheduled.

- Veterans Day. Veterans Day is on Wednesday 11 November, and a program to honor our military veterans on that day is being planned.
- Thanksgiving. Thanksgiving is on Thursday 26 November, and the Post restaurant will again feature a classic Thanksgiving dinner — for both takeout and on premises dining.
- Troop Shipping. The Auxiliary is preparing for another troop shipping on Saturday 7 November just in time for the Holidays, and everyone is requested to donate items for this shipping. Donations may be left in the clearly marked containers in the Post parking lot and near the parking lot gate into the Post.
- Christmas Boat Parade. The annual Newport Beach Boat Parade is scheduled for Wednesday 16 December through Sunday 20 December. SAL Squadron 291 is working with the Post restaurant staff to sponsor dining at the Post with excellent parade viewing opportunities. This is a very important annual fundraiser for the SALs, and the entire Post 291 Family membership and the public is encouraged to support it.
- Christmas. Post activities this year related to Christmas will be very limited, but the Post restaurant will once more provide an outstanding Christmas dinner, available for both takeout and on premise dining. Further details will be published on the Post website as the date approaches.

Please continue to follow good hygiene practices and stay safe and healthy — and come enjoy your Post!

Covid or no Covid, know that your SAL Eboard and volunteers are hard at work. It's important to us to not shrink back, but to move forward. Our charities keep working to help those less fortunate and still depend on our support. Perhaps more now than ever. The Veterans and Veteran families that they serve still have needs. Covid doesn't stop poverty, or other sickness, or the needs of those dependent on those that give. We made the decision early on to continue to be a support leg for those less fortunate. We made the decision, not to shrink back and manage the crisis, but to be the leaders that we are and LEAD through the crisis. That is easier said than done, as there are continuous new obstacles, but we are a team of overcomers who go through, over, and around those obstacles to continue on with the mission of our organization. Since the beginning of this year, you will be happy to know that we have done just that. We've given over \$56,000 to our charitable causes, so that they can continue. The 1st Marine Foundation of Newport Beach recently sent us a very nice thank you, as they were able to use our donation to help renovate the barracks at Camp Pendleton. More important now than ever because many of the Marines were quarantined and could not even go to chow. The renovations we helped them to make made life for our heroes that much more comfortable. We were proud to be there and continue our support.

We've given to some great charities, Patriots and Paws, Fisher House (like a Ronald McDonald House at the VA for Veteran families while their loved one receives care at the VA), Young Marines, Boy Scouts, Knots of Love, and Patriotic Service Dog Foundation. We've taken our Veteran's fishing four times as a way to provide sanctuary and peace to those that suffer PTSD. They were limited, but we adapted, we improvised, and we overcame to make them a success. On Flag Day, unable to obtain a permit for Veteran's Park, we took the event to the boardwalk and handed out flags, flag pins, and comic books about the Pledge of Allegiance and the American Flag. Flags were seen on bicycles and in the hands of pedestrians from the Newport Beach Pier to the Balboa Pier. It was a great site to behold. We were granted access to have a small memorial on 9/11 at the Post where we had our Legion Honor Guard present the colors and we had our friend, Honor Guard Commander Brian Fleming, speak along with Lt. Joe Cartwright from the NBPD and 1st Marine Foundation. We had a bagpiper play us out with Amazing Grace. It was small, but poignant. Most importantly, we remembered.

Sadly, the only thing missing was the ability for our friends and members to share these experiences with us. Know that while the fear of Covid has impacted our interactions, it has not impacted our actions. We are working hard, representing each of you, building our reputation in the community and making an impact wherever possible. As time passes, the fear factor will lessen, treatment and remedies will evolve, and I expect that life will gradually return to normal. We look so forward to seeing you all again at the Post for meetings, etc. soon. In the meantime, the patio is still open for dining. The periodic opportunities to say hello are cherished. ### **Comments**

How do you run a business when your gross profit drops by 60%? For most businesses, the answer would be "You can't". The Post can, though, because we're a lot more than just a business. We're a strong, membership organization that includes not only about four thousand dues-paying members, but also three, vibrant Legion programs which contribute vitally to the Post both monetarily and voluntarily. We are not going to be defeated by a virus.

The results of the Post's 2019 audit are in, delayed a bit because of Covid 19 restrictions. The auditors gave the Post a "clean" opinion, meaning that the financial statements "...present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Newport Harbor Post 291 of the American Legion as of December 31, 2019 and 2018, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America."

The report was submitted to the E-board at their October 8th meeting by the audit committee, which recommended approval. The audit committee also recommended approval of the auditor's internal control review, and made a further recommendation that the Post prepare rolling, ninety-day income and expense projections in light of the uncertain business climate. These were already being done internally by Office Manager Tracey Kleimeyer and me for distribution to the finance committee, house committee and E-board, but will now be presented at the general member meetings, too, starting with the meeting on October 14th. You can check out the report when the meeting minutes are posted on the website.

# American Legion Boys State/Nation

One of the most respected educational programs of government instruction for U.S. high school students.

American Legion Boys State is among the most respected and selective educational programs of government instruction for U.S. high-school students. A participatory program in which students become part of the operation of local, county and state government, Boys State was founded in 1935 to counter the socialism-inspired Young Pioneer Camps. The program was the idea of two Illinois Legionnaires, Hayes Kennedy and Harold Card, who organized the first Boys State at the Illinois State Fairgrounds in Springfield.

At Boys State, participants learn the rights, privileges, and responsibilities of franchised citizens. The training is objective and centers on the structure of city, county, and state governments. Operated by students elected to various offices, Boys State activities include legislative sessions, court proceedings, law-enforcement presentations, assemblies, bands, choruses, and recreational programs.

Legion posts, including Post 291, select high-school juniors to attend the program. For 2021, we have a goal of selecting 25 young men to attend California Boys State which will be held at California State University, Sacramento from June 18 to 26, 2021.

In early November and mid-December, we will be contacting local schools asking their assistance in nominating deserving young men. On February 6 and 7, 2021, we will be holding interviews to select the 25 delegates.

We need your help. We need volunteers to call on schools, help with administration, and to interview the nominees. If you would like to participate in this very rewarding and worthwhile program, please contact Jim Updike at jeusail@gmail.com.

# **Veteran Emergency Assistance Fund**

Orange County has a large veteran population. One recurring problem continues to come up among the agencies serving these veterans. Who can provide immediate financial assistance when a veteran or veteran family needs help? Despite the desire to serve veterans and the many VA programs and private grants focused on this population, when a motel is needed on a Friday afternoon for a homeless family living in a car, there are few options.

American Legion Newport Harbor Post 291 is the largest in Southern California with 4000 veteran members and 6500 families in all the associated programs at the Post. When an agency must tell a desperate veteran that their request is more than the agency can handle or that it will take a week to make a decision and get a check cut, the veteran is told to call AL291. The Post Service Officer handles those calls and the volume has been growing for years. AL291 has been in the community since 1920 and is the most visible veteran service organization in the County. Last Fall, the Post decided to address this need with the Veteran Emergency Assistance Fund (VEAF). This is a dedicated fund to provide a fast response to the immediate financial needs of all veterans living in Orange County.

Since last Fall, the VEAF has raised over \$130,000 to be used exclusively for local veterans in need. Most of that was raised from generous veteran donors. All donations are restricted to the VEAF, kept in a separate account and used exclusively to help local veterans. An application is required to verify veteran status and questions about the current financial situa'tion of the veteran must be asked. Because AL291 is a member of the Orange County Veterans & Military Families Collaborative (OCVMFC) and works with many local agencies on a daily basis, information can be shared quickly, often verbally, to speed the approval process. A decision is quick and a check can be issued to a utility company, landlord or vendor the next day and often within hours. The Post will also share costs with another agency to ensure that no veteran asking for help is turned away or ignored. After all, veterans always help other veterans and they never leave anyone behind.
