

Holidays We Can Still All Enjoy!

Although Post 291 and its members — along with most other organizations and individuals in the State and country — are under severe restrictions because of the pandemic, we can all be thankful for many things this Holiday Season. We're still here! And — within the limits allowed and by following good health and safety practices — there are still plenty of family-oriented activities to enjoy in the spirit of the season.

What a year 2020 has been! — And it's not over yet! Yes, the Post is unable to host the many traditional holiday events this year that normally occur during this time; but 2021 holds great promise of enabling a return to a more nearly normal environment — after the vaccine is widely deployed and we all get shot up with it. In the meantime, the Post will continue to follow current health and safety protocols — including masks and social distancing — to keep our Post members and their guests and our Post employees as safe as possible.

Current Post Operating Rules

As you're all aware, Orange County has not only moved back into the Purple Tier, but is also in the Southern California Region for which the State's Stay At Home Order is in effect. As a result, "new" rules now in effect for the Post are:

- Post 291 is closed except for:
 - o Administrative services at the Front Office window.
 - o Drive-thru takeout food and beverage service. Note that dining at the Post is no longer permitted (neither inside nor outside). So please keep on taking advantage of the takeout service and enjoying the superb food offerings of Chef Ulises Dominguez and his highly skilled staff.
 - o Marina which is open, and slip renters and dry storage renters have access to and use of their vessels.
- Post parking lot:
 - o Takeout food and beverage customers must pick up their order and depart.
 - It's not a "picnic area."
 - o Parking is available only for:
 - Employees on duty.
 - Post Officers and Post Family representatives on official business.
 - Marina slip renters.
- Drive-thru takeout food and beverage service is available daily and open to the public 11:00 to 6:00 pm Monday through Friday; 12:00 noon to 5:00 pm Saturday; and 10:00 am to 5:00 pm Sunday.
- No in-person meetings may be held at the Post.
- All Post 291 Family meetings must be held by videoconference (webinars) and will continue indefinitely as the primary method for holding Post meetings.

Recent Post Activities

Notwithstanding the current severe restrictions on operations, the Post has been able to provide some critically needed services and pleasant dining opportunities to Post members and Post staff.

- CPR Training. Thanks to the dedicated efforts of Post member Joe Munday, the American Heart Association conducted Cardio Pulmonary Rescue (CPR) training attended by ten Post members and Post staff members on Saturday 21 November. This kind of training is essential to the welfare of our members and staff, and the Post will continue to emphasize its importance and to enable the training.
- Thanksgiving Dinner. With excellent weather, an incredibly delicious traditional Thanksgiving Dinner, and dining on the patios still permitted at the time, Thanksgiving was a supremely enjoyable day at the Post.
- VA Popup Clinic. On Saturday 12 December, the Veterans Administration staff from Long Beach provided free flu shots on a drive-thru basis in the Post parking lot. — This event was rescheduled from an earlier date because of inclement weather.
- Awards and Recognition. Two Post 291 program organizations received special recognition for their work:
 - o The American Legion Yacht Club was awarded the prestigious and coveted honor of Club of the Year for 2020 by the Southern California Yachting Association (SCYA).
 - o SAL Squadron 291 received a National award as the largest SAL squadron in The American Legion.
 - Congratulations to both of these outstanding Post 291 programs and to their respective leaders, ALYC Commodore Bruce Batcheller and SAL Squadron 291 Commander Tim Sullivan!

Post 291 continues to thrive — but your continuing support is urgently needed.

Member dues are an essential source of income to keep Post 291 going and enabling it to provide basic services to our American Legion members. — Please ensure that you renew your Post 291 membership for 2021 as soon as possible. And, of course, now membership can be renewed online at the Post website at www.al291.com as well as by stopping by the Post Front Office window, which is open during regular business hours from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm Monday through Friday.
- Support to Military Veterans Needing Assistance. Made possible by your generous contributions to the Veterans Emergency Assistance Fund, support to military veterans needing assistance continues under the skilled direction of Service Officer Cory Vigil.

Other Post Activities

- Christmas Dinner. Post activities this year related to Christmas will be very limited, but the Post restaurant will once more provide an outstanding Christmas dinner — available for takeout only. Further details will be published on the Post website as the date approaches.
- Meetings by Videoconference. Post official meetings will continue to be held, but only by videoconference until the current pandemic is resolved.

It has been quite a year to say the least. A two-week shutdown in March became 32 weeks and still counting of a grinding halt to our economy and freedom as we know it. Many people are suffering from not only the Corvid illness, but the unintended consequences in its wake. The Auxiliary has strived to continue to support our military families and our community. With the help and generosity of the Legion families, we have managed to bring some much-needed joy into the lives of others.

In October, we asked people visiting the Post, for donations of food, personal hygiene items and cash to support our holiday Troop Shipping event which took place November 7th. Despite a rain drenched Saturday, we packed 94 boxes and sent them to our troops overseas. The great nephew of an Auxiliary member serving with the Marines in Japan received four boxes. "Holy Cow," was his exclamation when he and his buddies popped open the boxes of goodies. They were very grateful to be remembered especially this time of year. A big thanks to Lily Romanow and Janice Flanagan for all their hard work in buying and organizing. Lily and Janice will also be shopping for our family of four we are adopting for the holidays.

Our Auxiliary along with the other Legion families, donated a large sum of money to the American Legion Post 289 Riverside, which had been burglarized during a remodel. An estimated \$30,000 of tools and materials were stolen. With cash donations and volunteer labor, this Post was able to be open for Veterans Day.

We made our annual donation to the OC Rescue mission to help feed the hungry and donated to Strong Families/Strong Children and STEP (Support the Enlisted Project) for their annual pajama clothing drive for military children.

Proceeds from our Poppy sales in May have been helping to stock the empty pantry shelves at the VA in Long Beach for our homeless Vets. A big thanks to Peggy Bengry for her monthly grocery shopping trips and deliveries to the VA.

Bea Foster and her elves, are sponsoring a children's holiday party at Camp Pendleton on December 19th. We are again asking our members to participate in a toy drive for children ages 1 to 17. We will have our collection barrels out again for donations with posting of the items needed on our Facebook page ALA Unit 291.

It's budget time. According to the Post's bylaws, an annual budget for the coming year must be submitted for approval before the end of the current year. In normal times, this is a routine activity for the finance committee, but how do they create a meaningful budget when things are far from normal? When the 2020 budget was prepared last year, no one could have predicted that the Post would close down on March 18th, and only partially re-open a week later. Consequently, the budget was wildly off base. And what about the 2021 budget? How does one predict when the Post will be fully open, and predict the revenue and expenses before and after it does open? Hopefully, we can make educated guesses so we won't be terribly wrong, but it's still important to be as accurate as possible so we can plan for whatever the anticipated outcome may be.

As I mentioned in a previous SeaBreeze, the Post is in a stronger financial position than most enterprises because of our programs, our marina, and our membership. Our food and beverage operations, however, are currently operating at a net loss, especially since our outside patio dining had to close down. The curbside service is still worth continuing because it pays most of its direct costs and keeps our employees working, and we don't want to lose our team, but this situation is starting to impact our cash reserves. To help offset this, former service officer Chase Wickersham recommended that we implement a donation program called "Planned giving", which contemplates donations that include appreciated securities and other assets. This will be gradually expanded, but to kick it off you should have received an email from me recently which explains how a donation of appreciated securities can be transferred to the Post, giving the donor a tax-deductible gift while avoiding a tax if the securities were otherwise to be sold. (Cash gifts are still gratefully accepted, too.) Either way, please remember the Post in your charitable giving this year.

American Legion Boys State/Nation

One of the most respected educational programs of government instruction for U.S. high school students.

As we approach the end of a year fraught with challenges brought about by a pandemic the likes of which we haven't seen since 1918, the phrase "that which doesn't kill us makes us stronger" comes to mind.



The leadership and volunteers of your Post families certainly have been tested this past year and it's gratifying to see how we've come together by adapting and overcoming. We are in a much better position to face the challenges of 2021 and give our Veterans a Post they so richly deserve.

One of my prime responsibilities this year was our Boys State program. Late in 2019 we set a goal of sending 25 young men in their junior year of high school to the California State Boys State. In March, just as we were getting ready to interview 31 young men, the COVID restrictions were put into place and we found we were no longer able to conduct the face-to-face interviews as we had always done in the past.

In the spirit of 'adapting and overcoming', we set up a series of phone interviews over a period of two days and were able to interview each of the 31 candidates and select 25 delegates.

Our sense of accomplishment was short lived, however. In April, as the pandemic worsened, the American Legion, Department of California, was forced to announce the cancellation of the 2020 session of Boys State. While this was most definitely a disappointment for the young men selected as delegates, each was given a Boys State pin and certificate showing they had at least been selected for the program.

As we approach 2021, we are again setting our sights high with a goal of selecting 25 young men for the 2021 session of California Boys State. Our primary source of attracting candidates are the schools surrounding our Post area. As a result of the COVID restrictions, many schools have greatly reduced their programs and it will be a challenge to get schools to nominate candidates.

We are looking to interview the candidates in February and, at this point, it's unlikely we will be able to do in person interviews once again. However, by now we are so used to holding virtual meetings, it's become almost second nature. I am convinced that, just as we were able to hold effective interviews last year, a virtual interview process will give us the ability to make excellent selections.

I want to thank everyone for their support this past year.

ALYC Selected as Club of the Year

As we close on 2020, we do so with the best news possible: ALYC was awarded "Club of the Year" by the Southern California Yachting Association (SCYA). This marks the second consecutive year ALYC has received this coveted award, and the club earned this distinction in the first year as part of the Senior Category, a competitive group of the largest and most prestigious clubs within SCYA.

"I am just so proud of our club to come together during this crazy year and put forth a concerted effort to maintain as much activity as we could manage safely," commented Bruce Batcheller, Commodore of ALYC. "Through the leadership of the officers and directors and volunteers, and the spirit of our members who participated in our activities, we all rose to the occasion to get it done. I am not at all surprised that a group of veterans accepted the challenge and overcame the obstacles to see ALYC to the top scoring position."

This award goes only to the club that earned the most points on the criteria predetermined by SCYA. The criteria are wide ranging and cover items like hosting of regattas, cruises, youth sailing, charitable endeavors, club officer attendance at SCYA events, and many other items.

This is only the second time ALYC has received the award in consecutive years. They have now won it 11 times out of the 26 years since the award was initiated in 1994.
