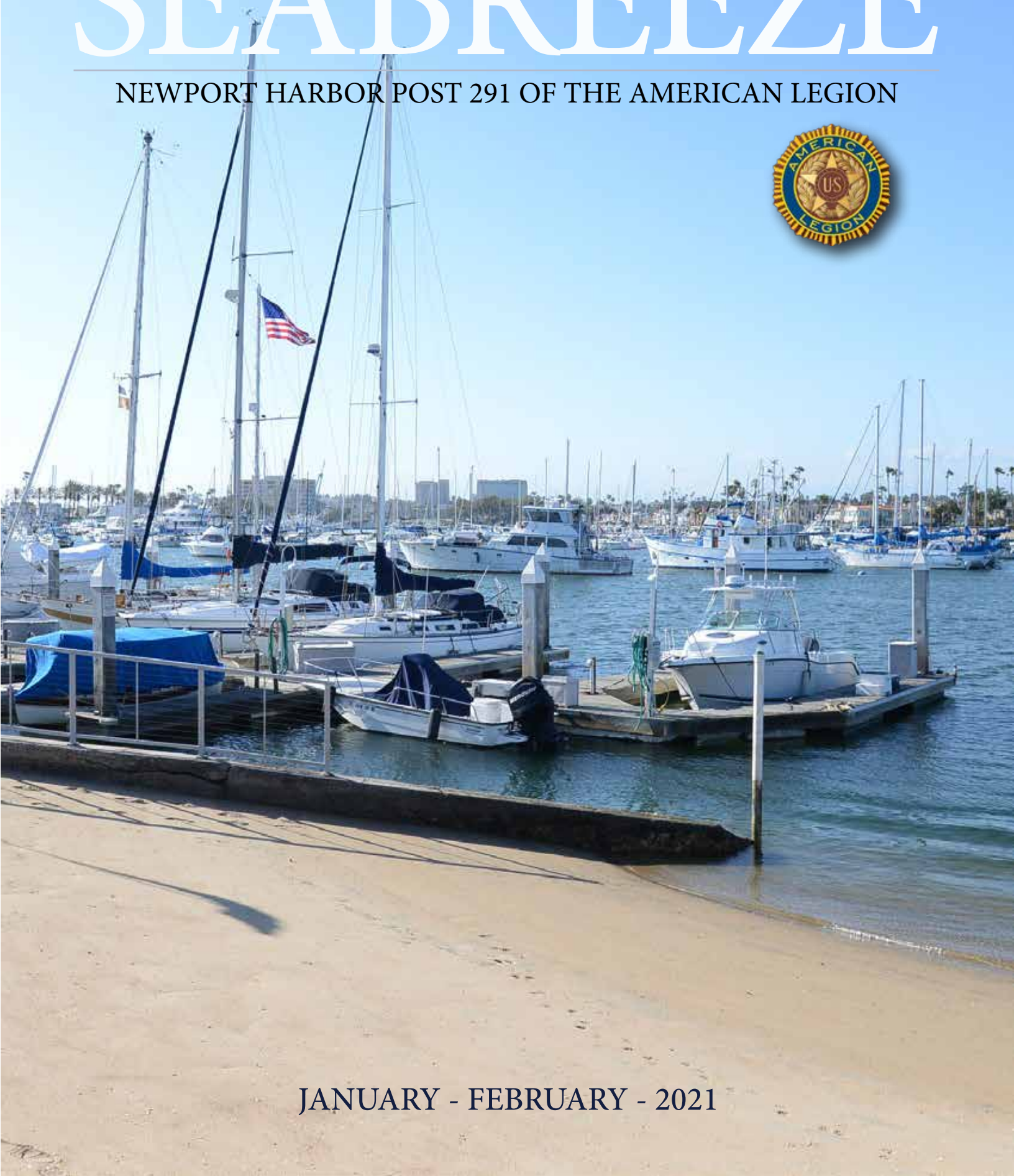

Welcome to the New Year!

During the last week in January, the Stay at Home Order that included Orange County was canceled, enabling the Post to reopen outside dining on the patios. And in spite of the sometimes challenging weather and cooler temperatures, the Post is still an outstanding, beautiful venue here on the water in Newport

Harbor to enjoy great food and delicious beverages. Although Orange County is still in the Purple Tier and only outside dining at this point is permitted, additional heaters have been acquired to enhance comfort out on the patios. And the West Patio offers additional shielding from the prevailing west winds. So please keep on taking advantage of the excellent takeout service and enjoying the superb food offerings of Chef Ulises Dominguez and his highly skilled staff, and continue to visit the Post and enjoy yourselves throughout the coming months.

Current Post Operating Rules

As long as Orange County remains in the Purple Tier (Tier 1), dining at the Post is limited to outside on the patios. As a reminder, here is a summary of the current Post services and operating rules associated with that Tier.

- Drive-thru takeout food and beverage service is available daily — and open to the public — 11:00 am to 6:00 pm Monday through Friday; 12:00 noon to 5:00 pm Saturday; and 10:00 am to 5:00 pm Sunday.
- Outdoor dining on the patios during the same operating hours is available to Post 291 Family members and guests.
- No in-person meetings (“gatherings”) may be held at the Post.
- All Post 291 Family meetings must be held by videoconference.
- Videoconferencing (Webinars) will continue indefinitely as the primary method for holding Post meetings. — If assistance is needed, please contact Adjutant Mike Berdine.

- Marina is open — and slip renters and dry storage renters have full access to and use of their vessels.
- Reopening Planning Committee, chaired by Third Vice Commander Jim Updike, will continue to explore options and methods for further reopening the Post.
- Support of military veterans needing assistance continues — under the skilled direction of Service Officer Cory Vigil.
- Administrative services are available at the Front Office window during regular business hours of 9:00 am to 5:00 pm Monday through Friday.

- Veterans Emergency Assistance Fund (VEAF) Campaign. A new VEAF campaign is underway and will run through Memorial Day, Monday 24 May. Your generous contributions to the Veterans Emergency Assistance Fund enables the continuing support to military veterans needing assistance.
- American Red Cross Blood Drive. Under the experienced and expert sponsorship of Post Auxiliary Unit 291, another blood drive was conducted by the American Red Cross at the Post on Monday 15 February. Although it was "by appointment only," it was completely "sold out" — with all available appointments filled. — More outstanding work by our Auxiliary on this critical service, and for which the Post and the community are exceedingly grateful!

So yes, the Post is at least partially open, and everyone in the Post 291 Family is encouraged to come enjoy it! — And please continue to stay safe and healthy!

Election Voting Process

Given the uncertainties surrounding the COVID restrictions and the distinct possibility that we would not be able to hold the May General Membership meeting in person and, hence, the elections, Commander Reynolds formed an Election Voting Process Committee to explore contingencies with the ultimate goal of being able to hold elections for the Post E-Board during the May 12 General Membership meeting.

The Committee reported their recommendations to the Post E-Board at the E-Board meeting on February 4. The Committee stated, "The primary goal of the Committee was to get on the other side of this year's election and have our Membership look upon the election process with pride and with the feeling that everything possible was done to ensure that Members had an opportunity to vote within the constraints imposed by the COVID restrictions and that no Member felt they were disenfranchised."

The Committee recommended that the E-Board develop two contingency plans:

- Plan A – If, by May 12, the restrictions have been lifted and gatherings are once again permitted, the Post would hold the Membership meeting in person and elections would proceed as we have done in past years.
- Plan B – If the restrictions are still in place, we would hold the May General membership meeting virtually as we have been doing for several months now and that we would develop an on-line voting system.

The Committee noted that there were several critical features that must be present in utilizing an online system:

- Security – the system must be secure and tamper-proof. In addition, it would be important to have a system available giving our Members a strong level of comfort.
- Members must have as fair and equal opportunity as possible to attend and participate in the balloting process.
- The system must be as easy and intuitive to use as possible.
- Anonymity must be guaranteed.
- There needs to be the institution of a 'Help Desk' both prior to and during the meeting to assist Members who run into connection difficulties.

In November 2020, ALYC faced this same situation. They were able to meet the critical features noted above and hold a successful election using their membership management software/platform, Wild Apricot. Fortunately, we can emulate their success.

The E-Board adopted the Committee's recommendations and work is now underway to have the system in place for this year's election.

Details will be sent to the Membership as the voting system develops.

In the last issue of Seabreeze I spoke about the challenges facing us as we attempted to reach this year's goal of sending 25 young men to California Boys State. Faced with the restrictions imposed by the pandemic, we were not at all certain that schools would be in a position this year to nominate sufficient candidates for us to be able to make our selection of Delegates.

I am happy to report that our fears were unfounded. 14 schools nominated 30 outstanding candidates. The Boys State Committee interviewed all 30 utilizing something we have become all too familiar with; Zoom. It was a herculean effort conducting an interview every half-hour from 9:00 am to 6:00 pm on Saturday, February 6 and from 9:00 am to 5:30 pm on Sunday, February 7. By the end of the weekend, we had selected 25 Delegates to this year's California Boys State.

Despite the exhausting schedule, everyone on the Committee agreed that having the opportunity to speak with these young men was incredibly rewarding. Some of these young men are, indeed, the best of the best. The future of our nation is in good hands.

Because the COVID restrictions are still with us, California Boys State leadership decided that this year's Boys State will be held virtually from June 19 to 25. Fortunately, they have some experience to draw on. Last year, Texas successfully held their Boys State on a virtual platform and California will be utilizing the same platform.

It declares that The American Legion recognizes the influence of Almighty God in all worthwhile endeavors-and declares the allegiance of Legionnaires to both God and Nation. First things have been put first. All that follows is in conformity."

For me and I hope for you as Legionnaires, "Almighty God" keeps first things first. That is where we will find our hope and peace. So when we are bombarded by the news of the day or pressured by the demands of our work schedule or we are feeling isolated and lonely, may you each find refuge in God!

VEAF

Veterans Emergency Assistance Fund

Helping Veteran Families with Children

The Service Officer at AL291 is often asked to solve problems and help veteran families with children. We were asked by another American Legion Post to help a veteran family requesting rental assistance.

The Service Officer discovered that they had five kids, the husband, a disabled Marine, was unable to work, the wife was taking care of a new baby and their funds were limited since the wife could not return to work immediately. A quick review of their finances made it obvious that the husband's disability check would not be enough for the family to survive in Orange County. It turns out that they had family in Texas and the option of relocating to a less expensive area where family could provide a safety net was discussed.

The Service Officer helped them reach a decision to relocate which AL291 and the VEOF made it possible. The Service Officer spoke to the landlord about terminating the lease and provided advocacy to avoid any potential legal and eviction issues.

The VEOF provided funds for transportation, moving expenses and other incidentals and the family was off to Texas with new contacts and specific resources in their new community. We have since heard that the family is settled in a house outside of Dallas and the wife has found a new job. A lot of planning and case management went into this process and ultimately their decision. This is why the service officer and the POST 291 is critical in the community.

Orange County has some of the most expensive real estate in the Country and some veterans discover that they cannot afford to live here. Being a service officer sometimes means becoming a coach and financial advisor when help is requested. It may require a tough decision to leave the area particularly when kids in school are involved. The VEOF is a tool to help a veteran family move forward. The expertise along with the community agencies that the service officer has established relationships with has been vital. The POST 291 continues to lead the way in the community and work with veteran families and their children.
